 Δ a word with an old-fashioned meaning that is still with us is to tell = to count/reckon as in

- bank teller
- · election teller
- all told (= when all are counted)
- untold wealth
- to tell the time

 Psalms 147:4 KJV ∆ the three verbs below all have the meanings ofto count/account/recount/reckon/relate

    a tally = a record of a counting

the act of making a record of a counting


    a tally mark = a vertical/horizontal/slant stroke

some other distinguishing mark,
usually with a specified numerical value such as 1

    a tally stick = a wooden stick or bone


used to make a tally by notching
• the word tally
may also be used as
a transitive or an intransitive verb:
to tally = to make a tally, to record/tabulate
eg
to tally (up) the score in a game/contest
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∆ the five-count tally mark combination of
four vertical strokes
& one slant/horizontal stroke



or

four horizontal strokes & one slant/vertical stroke



represents a right/left hand with extended four fingers & with crossed thumb

∆ in principle all positive integers may be denoted by tally marks viz just write down n tally marks to denote the positive integer n; this method becomes a practical impossibility beyond very small numbers which fact was recognized by the Roman system of numeration & the ancient Chinese system of rod numerals

∆ there is good extant artifact evidence for the statement that the Indo-Arabic numerals for the first three positive integers were suggested by tally marks viz

• one 1 is from a single vertical tally mark

• two 2 is from a pair of horizontal tally marks where it is attempted to write them cursively

• three 3 is from a triple of horizontal tally marks where it is attempted to write them cursively
